ABSTRACT (Arial/Helvetica, 12 pt, capitalised, italicised, centred)

The abstract should not be more than 100 words long and be a concise, standalone summary of the paper. It should not contain citations, equations, figures or tables. The abstract should briefly state the research objective, the methods and results/conclusions of the research. The abstract heading should be a centred, italicised version of the heading type (see below) and not numbered; the abstract's body text should be New Times Roman or Times Roman, 10 pt, italicised and justified.

Keywords (Arial/Helvetica, 10 pt and bold): Journal, CODATA, , Publication style (5-10 keywords, Times New Roman, 10 pt, left aligned)

1 INTRODUCTION (NUMBERED ARIAL/HELVETICA, 12 PT, BOLD, CAPITALISED, LEFT ALIGNED)

The body text of the paper should be Times New Roman, 10pt and justified. The introduction should outline the motivation for the research and contain a review of the relevant literature. The paper should be organised into logical parts or sections and include a description of the problem, the means of solution, results and conclusions. Authors who use US letter page sizes should insert a manual page break at the end of each page to allow their papers to be printed out on the larger, standard A4 paper used widely elsewhere. Carriage returns should be avoided except in the following cases: a) at the end of a paragraph; b) after a heading; c) at the end of each entry on a list. The word processing package's automatic text wrap feature should be used instead of carriage returns in all other cases.

2 NEXT SECTION (NUMBERED ARIAL/HELVETICA, 12 PT, BOLD, CAPITALISED, LEFT ALIGNED)

Sections should be numbered consecutively, starting with the Introduction; headings should be placed on the left, not centred. Sub-sections should be numbered 1.1, 2.2, etc.

Units: The SI system should be used for all scientific and laboratory data; if, in certain instances, it is necessary to quote other units, these should be added in parentheses. Temperatures should be given in degrees Celsius. The unit 'billion' (10^9 in America, 10^{12} in Europe) is ambiguous and should not be used.

All publications cited in the text should be presented in a list of references following the text of the manuscript. In the text refer to the author's name (without initials) and year of publication, e.g. "Since Peterson (1993) has shown that..." or "This is in the agreement with results obtained later (Kramer, 1994)". For 2-6 authors, all authors are to be listed at first citation, with "&" separating last two authors, for more than six authors, use the first six authors followed by et al. Subsequent citations for three or more authors use author et al. in the text. The list of references should be arranged alphabetically by authors' names after the acknowledgement section.

The manuscript should be carefully checked to ensure that the spelling of authors' names and dates are exactly the same in the text as in the reference list.

Mathematics: Equations should be numbered consecutively throughout the text and the appendices. The number should be enclosed in parentheses and set flush right on the same line as the equation. Equations should be referenced within the text as “Eq. (x)”.

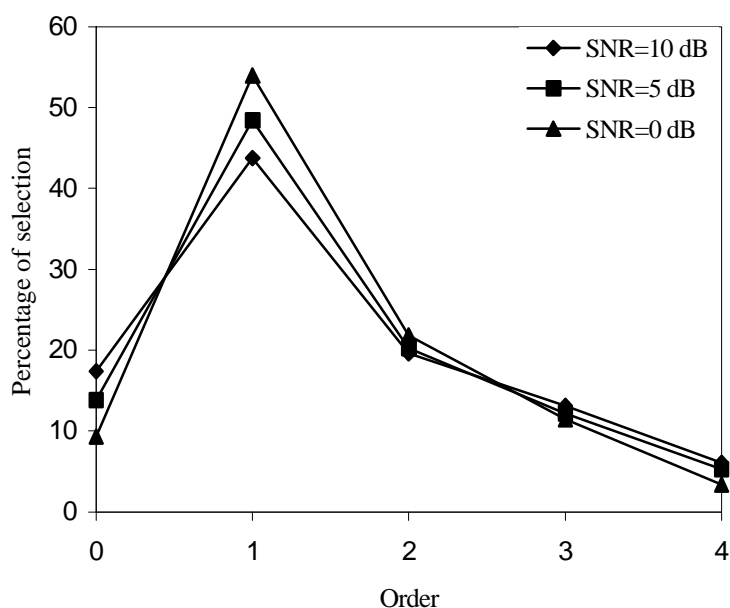


Figure 1. Histogram of the orders selected by the automatic algorithm for clean speech (Times New Roman, Times Roman, 10 pt, left aligned)

Figures and Tables, including their captions, should be included in the text, after, but close to the positions where they are first referenced. All figures and tables should be numbered consecutively. Figures should be referenced within the text as “Figure 1”.

Figure captions should appear under the figure while table captions should appear above the table. Their meanings should still be apparent when read separately from the main text. Both should be in New Times Roman or Times Roman, 10 pt and left aligned. They should be of the form “**Figure 1.** This is a figure.” and “**Table 1.** This is a table” Avoid using vertical rules in tables. Tables should not duplicate results presented elsewhere in the manuscript, e.g. in graphs.

References not readily available to readers should be avoided; for example, those to articles pending publication or to private communications.
